

I am Susie Andricic the Incoming CEO of the Aboriginal Sobriety Group Indigenous Corporation (ASG).

I am very grateful to have this privilege and opportunity to work with ASG, and especially the Aboriginal Communities of South Australia. Previous to accepting the role I was a Director of the Board of ASG for almost two years, and believe the placement on the Board provided me with a clear understanding of the challenges and barriers that ASG faces.

During the past month of my role, I have encountered a couple of operational obstacles, but these have since proved positive changes moving forward. I am exceptionally please to report ASG is now governed by a full representation of Aboriginal Directors, and as I am a non-Aboriginal woman I will be certainly calling upon the Directors to provide any cultural advice and/or support as determined.

Just a snap-shot about me, I was born and raised in the Le Fevre Peninsula. I attended Taperoo Primary and High Schools, commenced my career on a Government traineeship in 1984. I am married with two children, enjoy fishing and time on the water.

My work history is 35 years with the SA Housing Authority, and during this time I also held a Director's position with the Aboriginal women's family violence service, Nunga Mi:Minar for over 8 years. This experience has provided me with many opportunities building, and to continue to build networks and connections.

I am very excited to work with ASG's dedicated staffing team – in the short time I have been in the role I especially appreciate the team of professional ASG Managers who are extremely focused in delivering programs and the individual case managed care they deliver for our clients: as health support away from addictions, including providing any individual with social justice supports and assistance.

I am looking forward in continuing my working relationship with the Board of Directors, albeit now with a completely different hat. The Directors have recently completed the Strategic Plan 2021-2023 and as always the Directors remains focused on compliance, its corporate objectives and in meeting funding obligations.

My focus is to ensure ASG will continue to not only deliver better practice services and remain unique, but listen to Community needs and aspirations, and to work to grow the organisation to deliver positive and innovative programs that support the Community of South Australia's objectives.


